Traditionally it is seen that medieval women were invisible, but Cindy shall consider ways in which existing sources can be used to see the female experience, from all walks of life, using individuals from medieval times including medieval women from Winchester as examples.</p>

Our Lady Chapel is one of the most impressive areas of the Cathedral, and we are lucky to retain the only pre-Reformation choir stalls in the country, along with vast stained glass windows, colourful vaulting, and the remains of extraordinary paintings of legends of the Virgin Mary.</p>
